Comhairle Laighean Bye Laws 2020 COMHAIRLE LAIGHEAN C.L.G.

A. In accordance with Rial 3.29 T.O. 2019 Comhairle Laighean C.L.G. shall consist of a Chairperson, Vice-Chairperson, Treasurer, Public Relations Officer, Chief Executive Officer (full-time secretary) without voting rights and two representatives of each county. The immediate past Council Chairperson shall be an ex-officio member for the year following termination of office.

The Leinster Handball Council, the Leinster Higher Level Colleges Council, the Leinster Post-Primary Schools Council, and the Leinster Primary Schools' Committee shall each have one representative, without voting rights, on the Council.

B. In accordance with Rial 3.32 T.O. 2019, Comhairle Laighean C.L.G. shall appoint the following Sub-Committees whose duties and functions shall be as set out in Rule.

1. MANAGEMENT AND FINANCE COMMITTEE

There shall be a Management and Finance Committee which shall consist of the Comhairle Laighean Officers, plus four named representatives of the Council, two nominees of An Cathaoirleach and Rúnai of the Council (without voting rights) subject to approval of Comhairle Laighean CLG, four County Chairpersons (without voting rights) on rotation for 1 Year (i.e. over the term of Cathaoirleach Comhairle Laighean 12 County Chairpersons will have served on the Committee.

Quorum: The quorum shall be one quarter and not fewer than three of the members entitled to attend and with voting rights.

2. COMPETITIONS CONTROL COMMITTEE

There shall be a Competitions Control Committee which shall consist of the Cathaoirleach, Chief Executive Officer (without voting rights) the Leas Cathaoirleach, Treasurer, P.R.O., six named representatives from the counties on Comhairle Laighean C.L.G. (not represented on the Hearings Committee), 1 named representative of the Post Primary Schools and 1 named representative of Third Level Colleges.

(a) It shall have the authority to delegate appoint Sub-Committee(s) whose membership does not necessarily come from the members of C.C.C. to be responsible for the Management of Provincial Inter Club & Inter County activities other than Inter Club and Inter County Championships other than disciplinary matters which remain the responsibility of C.C.C..

(b) The Competitions Control Committee shall appoint a workgroup to appoint Referees and Match Officials as required for Competitions within the jurisdiction of Comhairle Laighean C.L.G. as provided for in Rial 3.30 T.O. 2019 and shall report as required to the Competitions Control Committee. The workgroup shall consist of an Officer (who shall act as Chairperson) two other voting members of the Competitions Control Committee and the Provincial Referees Administrator and a maximum of two other members.

3. HEARINGS COMMITTEE

There shall be a Hearings Committee which shall consist of a Chairperson and Secretary, and three other named members appointed by Comhairle Laighean C.L.G., six named representatives from the counties on Comhairle Laighean C.L.G. (not represented on the C.C.C.) who shall be elected on a rota basis on the nomination of their respective counties and the Chief Executive Officer (full-time secretary) whose only function shall be to act as a non-voting secretary to the Hearings Committee when dealing with Appeals. It shall consist of at least three members for any hearing.

(a) It shall adjudicate on all disciplinary matters where a hearing is prescribed and requested relating to the Enforcement of Rules arising from games under the control and jurisdiction of Comhairle Laighean C.L.G. and on reports arising from the Provincial Competitions Control Committee or its Sub-Committee.

(b) The Vice Chairperson of Comhairle Laighean may nominate an extra member to be added to the Hearings Committee during the year prior to the election of the following Chairperson. The appointee should be the Vice Chairperson's proposed nomination as Chairperson of the Hearings Committee during his/her term as Chairperson of Comhairle Laighean. This appointment shall be approved by Comhairle Laighean C.L.G.

(c) Whereas provided for in Rule 7.14 T.O. 2019 a newly Constituted Hearings Committee is required for a re-hearing or re-processing of a case the Cathaoirleach, Comhairle Laighean, may recommend for appointment by the Management and Finance Committee temporary members for the Hearings Committee and such temporary members do not have to be members of Comhairle Laighean.

4. COACHING AND GAMES DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

There shall be a Coaching and Games Development Committee whose named members are appointed by Comhairle Laighean on the recommendation of Leinster Management and Finance Committee.

It shall be responsible for monitoring and evaluating County Performance in Games Development

5. PUBLICATION RELATIONS/MARKETING COMMITTEE

There shall be a Commercial & Communications Committee, whose members are appointed by Comhairle Laighean on the recommendation of Leinster Management and Finance Committee. It shall be responsible for the development and implementation of all Marketing and Public Relations Strategies and advise Comhairle Laighean on these and related matters. It shall assist County PRO's and where necessary provide adequate training and support. It shall report to the Management and Finance Committee.

6. CULTURE & COMMUNITY COMMITTEE

There shall be a Culture & Community Committee, the Executive of which shall consist of a Chairperson who shall be appointed by Comhairle Laighean; two Scór representatives and two Coiste Gaelige Laighean representatives.

7. COMHAIRLE IARBHUNSCOILEANNA LAIGHEAN

There shall be a Post-Primary Schools Sub-Committee known as Comhairle Iarbhunscoileanna Laighean which consists of

- Chairperson appointed by Comhairle Laighean
- Secretary who shall be the Provincial Post Primary Schools Officer.
- Named Representative on Comhairle Laighean.
- Named Representative from each County Post-Primary Committee.
- Provincial Schools Servicing Officers.

The Council Committee has the authority to add other personnel when deemed appropriate.

The Committee shall appoint a Competitions Control Committee which shall be responsible for all arrangements and control of games under the jurisdiction of the Post-Primary Schools Committee and matters arising from same, other than those functions reserved to the Provincial Hearings Committee, the Central Competitions Control Committee, the Central Referees' Appointments Committee and the Central Hearings Committee.

Quorum – 3 members.

CCC shall hear objections and Counter Objections arising from and games under its control.

It shall investigate and process matters relating to the Enforcement of Rules and Match Regulations, other than those functions reserved to the Committees (dealing with disciplinary matters) stated above.

Disciplinary Matters (games related) – where a hearing is requested – shall be referred to the Leinster Hearings Committee.

CCC may appoint work groups to deal with delegated matters/activities i.e. Additional Competitions.

CCC, together with Provincial Coaching and Games Development Committee, shall be responsible for organising (a) Games Programmes for Post-Primary Schools in Leinster (b) Promotion of Development of Gaelic Games in Post-Primary Schools (c) Accepting Affiliations from School Year to School Year (d) Grading and Re-grading

The Committee shall report to Coaching & Games Development Committee.

8. REFEREES ADMINISTRATION COMMITTEE

There shall be a Referees Administration Committee which shall consist of the Provincial Referees Administrator (who shall act as Chairperson) and the Referees' Administrators of the twelve Counties in the Province.

The Secretary of this Committee may be one of the County Referees' Administrators or an additional person appointed by Comhairle Laighean C.L.G.

9. PLANNING & PHYSICAL DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

There shall be a Leinster Infrastructure Safety and Insurance Committee whose members are appointed by Comhairle Laighean on the recommendation of Leinster Management and Finance Committee.

Chairmans Address to Convention

Iar-Uachtaráin, iar oifigighm agus a dhaoine uaisle tá fáilte romhaibh uilig chuig Comhdhail Cinn Bliana Laighean i Óstán Knightsbrook anseo i mBaile Átha Troim anocht.

Firstly I would like to thank Meath GAA on their invitation to hold our convention here tonight in the historic town of Trim. We were here recently enough as we launched very successfully, our Senior Football Championship and utilised the magnificent back drop of the Castle for our photo-shoot.

Our Sporting Fields 2018

Hurling

After an enthralling round robin series Galway the reigning all-Ireland champions at the time team needed two bites at the cherry before they overcame Kilkenny in a sweltering Thurles to retain their provincial title. Kilkenny were at the time the recently crowned 2018 Alliance League Champions and proved once again that kittens in Kilkenny take very little time to turn into cats! Once again the Bob O'Keefe crossed the Shannon and subsequently Galway came very close to retaining their all-Ireland crown when they lost out to Limerick by the narrowest of margins.

2018 was the year we welcomed Galway into our u/21 championship and they took full advantage by winning the silverware but only after a memorable epic against Wexford that went all the way to the wire in extra time. Hurling folk are still talking about this one.

Imagine scoring 7-12 and ending up on the losing team well that fate befell the Kilkenny minor hurlers who lost out to a Dublin team that scored 6-19 in a game which was a true score-fest. Ironically, Kilkenny went onto the all-Ireland final while Dublin were defeated at the all-Ireland semi-final stage by the eventual winners Galway.

It should be noted that Kilkenny played a total of 10 games, none were replays losing 3 times including the All-Ireland Final.

Wexford won the Walsh Cup in a history making final in Nowlan Park as they won it after a draw - in a 65m free taking competition.

In a battle of the blue and gold colours Longford came out on top by the narrowest of margins to defeat Wicklow in the Bord ná Mona Kehoe Cup.

Club Hurling

In the final Ballyhale Shamrocks put in a fine display to defeat Ballyboden St. Endas. I wish them the best against the Munster champions Ballygunner and I believe that they can go all the way!

Kilkenny champions won both the intermediate and junior titles. Unfortunately Graigue-Ballycallan lost out by the narrowest of margins last weekend in the All-Ireland semi-final. However, Dunamaggin are through to the All-Ireland final and I wish them only the best in the quest for that additional piece of silverware.

The following won Leinster Senior club league honours which are much valued competitions:-Shinrone, Belmont, Eire Og CorraChoill and St. Kevin's Dublin, well done to all.

Hurling Monies

Three of our four designated Counties this coming year will operate in the Joe McDonagh cup. Progress with these counties is evident in many ways but particularly when we look at the support mechanisms all have in place around their teams.

Congratulations to Carlow the inaugural winners of the Joe McDonagh a great achievement as the competition was keen and turned up many excellent matches. They are now replaced by Offaly who it has to be said were very competitive last year and their addition this year, I am sure, will make the McDonagh cup very interesting again this year.

Ideally, I would like to see more Leinster teams compete in the Bob O'Keefe however, we are where we are as they say but it is something I will push for in the near future.

With this particular project pre-spend approval continues, accordingly I would like to acknowledge Nickey Brennan and the lads who have worked tremendously hard on this project from the out-set.

Football

Dublin footballers were the masters once again, breaking their own record by winning their 8th Leinster title in a row against somewhat of a surprise package in the guise of Laois, who built on their Alliance National League Division 4 title which capped a very successful year for them.

However, magnificent Dublin crowned their year by going all the way winning a record equalling 4 Sam Maguire's in succession - a magnificent achievement by any standard particularly when we factor in what is required to win at this ultra-competitive level and I would like to commend them for that.

Kildare were the inaugural winners of the u/20 championship and used their victory as a springboard to go and win the ultimate prize which based on their performances throughout the year was fully merited.

Meath won the inaugural minor title at u/17 level however, and unfortunately for them, they succumbed to a fine Galway side in the all-Ireland semi-final.

Our Bord na Mona O'Byrne Cup final was played later in the year than usual, in May between neighbours - ultimately Meath coming out as victors over Westmeath.

Our junior champions were Kildare who turned in a fine performance in the final however,

they came up short against a fine Kerry team in the all -Ireland semi-final.

Club Football

A day that will live long in the memory -Mullinalaghta's historic defeat of Kilmacud Crokes in Tullamore. This was a proper 'David versus Goliath' contest - of course as we all know we would never have heard of David if he was the same size as Goliath!

I now wish Mullinalaghta the first Longford team to achieve this feat only the best against another Crokes team this time of the Killarney variety in the All- Ireland semi-final and I hope they go all the way.

Unfortunately our intermediate and junior champions Two-Mile House (Kildare) and Young Irelands (Louth) respectively, lost out narrowly at the All-Ireland semi-final stage just last weekend. Commiserations to both teams especially after showing so much promise in our own championships.

Coaching and Games

Once again this is the area where we have our biggest spend and 2018 was no exception in this regard. As you have heard through Pat's report earlier we have had a significant increase in spending here, attributable in the main to the East Leinster project specifically with the recruitment of staff and it should be noted that this project is in year 2 of 3.

While development of our players is extremely important so is 'bang for our buck' accordingly, we would like to see a return on our investment and in this regard we need to be relentless with regard to oversight mechanisms which is essentially measuring performance. However, I think you will agree that the lads in their earlier presentation gave all of us very good insight into depth and breadth of their work in this very important area.

As you will have noted the TURAS initiative has blossomed which is very welcome relative to empowering our club coaches. This initiative I believe will only go from strength to strength and clubs are the real beneficiaries.

Health & Wellbeing / Games for All

Once again I must commend the great work being undertaken by the Health & Wellbeing and Games for All Committees under the direction of Brian Carberry and Pat Lynagh respectively. While there is a push at Central level to amalgamate both committees I feel they operate better as separate entities. The size of our province must be taken into account and in addition, we must factor in the sensitivities of all of our relevant stakeholders.

In the 'Games for All' sphere worthy of mention once again is the success of our wheelchair hurlers as they retained their championship and league titles. Well done to all concerned - what an achievement.

Additionally, I would like to acknowledge and commend all involved in our special schools football where we run provincial blitz competitions culminating with a day out in Croke Park where excitement and un-bridled joy are commonplace. No money can buy this type of enjoyment.

In the Health & Wellbeing arena we are well aware of the pressures on our current day players. Gambling is a massive issue with online platforms so readily assessable - it poses a huge challenge for us, especially as there does not appear to be a silver bullet cure in this regard. It is in all our interests to address this.

Social media has its positives however, with the advent of the so called keyboard warrior brigade whose faceless comments have had detrimental effects on many of our players and mentors alike. This is another area of huge challenge for us as there is seemingly very little we can do.

Associating the word warrior with them and their antics is I believe wholly inappropriate - to my mind the term 'keyboard cowards' would be more apt. However, balanced and objective comment is always welcome.

Cross-County Competitions

As previously mentioned the Senior Hurling Leagues are becoming increasingly more popular. Surpassing them is our underage cross county leagues with a massive take-up. This is a hugely positive initiative in relation to developing players and teams as they are exposed to regular meaningful games that will stretch them in a suitable fashion.

Referees

Referee support continued at apace under the guidance Donal Smith and John Bannon and I would like to acknowledge and thank all concerned. Abbotstown continued as the venue for fitness preparation /testing and presentations. Our coaching and games staff were extremely supportive and I would like to thank in particular Colm Clear and Emmett Egan in this regard.

Anyone who ever refereed or tried to ref knows how difficult a task it can be and we are lucky in Leinster to have so many quality refs however, with retirements and recruitment proving difficult we will have to make additional efforts to sustain and hopefully enhance the numbers.

Our fixtures schedule in 2018 posed many problems for us when it came to finding officials. In relation to encouraging more refs to come on board a few things are worth trying-

1. Eradicate abuse of refs -this applies all round i.e. players, mentors and spectators.
2. Full support of refs on disciplinary matters i.e. eroding the culture of trying everything in the book in relation to getting a player off. We all know right from wrong from an early age however, if a mistake was made by a referee it will be fairly apparent from early on I believe.
3. Not excluding top refs at 50years of age if they fulfil all the relevant criteria.



In relation to the recently tried and ongoing rule experimentation I am satisfied the refereeing viewpoint was taken on board.

Where we can we should try and make the referee's lot easier an easier lot particularly in relation to our club refs and the suggestion in some quarters of having a second referee to me seems nonsensical.

After all we have 4 refs and 4 umpires officiating at our top games –how many more officials do we really need? Perhaps we should empower support officials more!

Finally it was great to see that we piloted umpire training which by all accounts was very well received.

Finances

Pat presented our positive accounts earlier however, they do come with a health warning. Hurling for the first time ever outshone the big ball on gate receipts.

The drawn replay of the hurling was a great help but we cannot afford to rest on our laurels. In relation to football we had three of the less populated Leinster Counties in our semi-finals with Laois going through to our final. While we did not get our usual take through the turnstiles this is not necessarily a negative as we cannot underestimate the knock on, positive injection football and the GAA in general has received in the counties of Carlow, Laois and Longford as a direct consequence of their progress. This is an intangible that I believe is well worth the hit in the pocket and perhaps is also a wakeup call for some other counties as well.

Football has received much bad press of late. It is understandable that we get criticism from outside our great association but it galls me when the berating in this regard comes for within. Football has evolved, possession is king, after all the opposition as we know cannot score when you have the ball.

Yes I accept there are issues with football and we have tried and are continuing and will continue to address those issues. At present we have many of the fittest, strongest, smartest and most dedicated players playing our game than we ever had. The recently commissioned ERSI report found that our top players are putting 31 hour a week into our games. They are measured and analysed like never before. What kind of a message are we sending to them? What kind of a message are we sending to our young aspiring players who also love our game? What do they think when they hear some iconic foot-balling people state that they cannot watch our great game anymore – we have a duty to those players not to go down the populist route. We must I believe stand up for our games! As we know life is change and change can be a challenge.

Back to the financial situation, overall I satisfied that we are in a position to add to our capital fund which is important as we know we have many 'mouths to feed,' so to speak. Well done and a big thank you to Pat and John Brown for doing a fine job for us.

Infrastructure, Safety & Insurance

Congratulations to Laois who are in the final phase of their Centre of Excellence and to Longford who are near completion of their works on Pearse Stadium. Meath and Kildare are well advanced with their County Ground up-grade plans and Louth have made significant progress in Dundalk since ending their stadium plan venture in Drogheda. Westmeath have taken a very practical approach in relation to their plan which is in its infancy and I commend them for that.

Prudence is the key word for all projects of this scale and we must develop for our actual needs to ensure the final build is 'fit for purpose'. Of course proper planning can serve to ease the financial burden.

The maintenance and upkeep of our facilities must also be factored in- as sometimes we neglect the ongoing operational and depreciation costs which can be significant.

Mile buíochas to Croke Park for the provision of the increased development fund grants.

Once again we were in a position to top-up the grants this year. Without the development officers within each county we would find it difficult to ensure that the works have been undertaken satisfactorily - a big thank you to all.

Safety

Our safety team continued their great work with club and county alike. In addition, they work closely with our insurance members in an area that is proving more problematic for us. This time last year I highlighted the changes that we needed to see in relation to the amount of third party events, the use of prohibited activities, record keeping and additionally the need to notify the insurance officer as soon as practicable after an accident or incident. Alas, that seems to have fallen on deaf ears given the finical hit we are facing. As I said last year it is easier to save money than it is to fundraise for it.

Our committee plays a very important role for us so to PJ and all the members a very big thank you.

Scór

On what is a very important year for Scór its 50th anniversary we will on the 10th March next hold the Senior Scór finals in the National Opera House in Wexford. In this iconic venue we already held the Scór Na nÓg finals on the 13th of the month last and the venue seemed to have brought out the best in the participants who set a very high standard. To mark this special year for Scór we have provided perpetual cups for all 14 competitions. 'Netwatch' have kindly sponsored these cups for us and I would like to acknowledge their support and generosity in this regard. In addition, I wish all our provincial winners the very best at the National Finals. Finally, Mile buíochas to Catherine, Áine and the committee who have excelled once again this year.

PR & Marketing

Through our organisational review we identified a resource gap here I would like to take this opportunity to welcome John Haughney to our ranks. Additionally, I would like to thank Cian Murphy for his great work for us over the last number of years and wish him the best in his Croke Park role.

Overseas

Overseas playing numbers are on the rise again. The commitment and dedication of our overseas units is best exemplified by Amsterdam when they participated in our junior club championship, covering the costs of the trip to Dublin, primarily out of their own pockets. Just compare that with how difficult it sometimes to get club membership from our own players here in Ireland. The sustainability of overseas units relative to resource requirements is a real challenge for us. Factoring in the diverse range of teams, nationalities and cultures, we, I believe have to have a wider conversation on this entire area. To provide clarity and direction an agreed policy is required which I believe will give comfort to overseas units in relation to where they actually sit within the GAA world.

Handball

Well done to our handball arm throughout what was an extremely busy and successful year. Thanks to John for keeping us very well informed through his comprehensive reports at our council meetings.

Discipline

Our hearings committee met on 23 occasions last year which is the record. They dealt with a massive workload stretching our volunteers to the limit. It is incumbent on all counties to ensure that CCC and hearing committee members are familiar with our official guide and disciplinary handbook. This is of particular relevance where there are many new members on committees. In this regard it is very disappointing that only one of our counties asked for a disciplinary workshop to be held. If more would avail of the expertise on our committee it could serve to make us a lot more efficient and effective on disciplinary matters especially in relation to our volunteer's time.

To Dick Butler, John Byrne and the hard working committee a big thank you.

Reflection

At this time of the year we often reflect on all the great gales we have lost in the last year and in this regard I would like to pay tribute to all the families, clubs and counties who have lost loved ones.

Michael our CEO has paid tribute to Paddy Clarke of Louth who had a unique coaching personality and did great work for us and of course Seamus Howlin of Wexford in his report.

Just a short year ago Seamus was with us at convention and addressed us as Chair of the National insurance committee. He fought his illness with great dignity and fortitude. Seamus as we know was long time PRO, a former vice-chair and chair of Leinster who oversaw the redevelopment/upgrade of Aras Laighean on foot of the foresight of another chairman Seamus Aldridge in relation to the purchase of the property. He was a very affable man and had friends the length and breadth of the province and further afield given his varying roles at National level and overseas. Our thought are with his wife Vera and his family and all families who suffered loss - Ar dheis Dé go raibh a h-anamnacha.

Challenges/Issues

Ticket prices are the latest hot topic. It hard to credit but the issue was raised in the Dail – more populist rhetoric. Our association recycles somewhere in the order of 82cent out of every euro we take in, surpassing all other organisations including charities. Therefore we are in a very strong position to defend our position on this, after all our clubs ultimately will be the beneficiaries.

Based on the National Club committee's survey 'empowerment' is the most important issue for clubs at present. We have to answer their call in this regard. Initiatives like Turas and Officer Training is already serving to address this I believe. However, we have to sustain our efforts and try where we can to reduce the bureaucratic burden on club officers which is a big deterrent to recruiting volunteers.

We are currently exploring the provision of more supports to Counties where skill-set deficiency has been identified as an impediment to progress. Areas such as finance, marketing, IT are typical of the deficiency areas identified.

As alluded to earlier to 31 hours a week our inter-county players are putting into their hobby - is this sustainable? Players at this level are younger and younger, many are students or are in careers that are compatible with this level of commitment required. Team preparation costs are well documented at club as well as county level.

It is now the entourage that are adding to our woes more and more. Our units have to become more self-sufficient in this regard and if we implement our mandatory coaching standards they should help – as ever with anything we deem to be mandatory is difficult to implement or police.

In relation to our new Ard Stiúirtheóir Tom Ryan I would like to take this opportunity to formally acknowledge his appointment and wish him well in his tenure in this very challenging role.

As ever the loyalty and support of staff in Aras Laighean is truly appreciated and our units throughout the province benefit in the main in this regard.

To the officers, volunteers and staff in each County throughout the province a big thank to you all for the welcome and courtesy shown to me over the year which is much appreciated.

It is my hope that we have supported you and served you well over the last year and rest assured that we strive to continually improve on that.

To the members of all our sub-committees a big thank you for all your work over the year and a special word of thanks for those of you who are leaving us at this juncture.

Through all our honest and open discussions by our management committee I would like to thank you for your support an input throughout the year.

To the 2 Pats and Martin my fellow officers a sincere thank you for your commitment, work and support at all times.

Report Of The Secretary





Introduction

Last season saw some tremendous action throughout the Province. The abiding memory for many will be of the history that was made. In terms of hurling the resurgence of the Model County while in football the continued excellence of Dublin. As we look forward to 2020 it is important to look back at what worked, or didn't, from last years Championships.

A Change of format in the Walsh Cup saw Galway, Kilkenny and Wexford join at the Semi Final stage following a round robin between Carlow, Dublin, Laois and Offaly. The Tribesmen ultimately emerged victorious with a win over Wexford in Enniscorthy.

The Kehoe Cup had a dramatic finish as it became the first Hurling game in the Province to be decided on penalties. Westmeath once again claimed the silverware meaning an extremely successful Leinster Series for the Lake Land County.

The Kehoe Shield was contested by DCU St Patricks, Longford and Louth. The Wee County repeated their Round Robin victory over DCU to claim the 2019 title.

Bórd na Móna have been excellent sponsors of the Leinster Series since 2012 and I thank them on your behalf for their commitment over the years.

Senior Championships

The hunt for the Bob O'Keefe Cup served up arguably the most exciting fare of the GAA Year. Who could have scripted such drama that would unfold on that faithful Saturday night in June? Following the full time whistle in Parnell Park and Dublin beating Galway by 4, mathematical experts were called into action when Kilkenny and Wexford ended level. A 4 way tie at the top saw the Westerners exit on score difference with old rivals Kilkenny and Wexford through to the Leinster showpiece.

June 30th and 51,000 patrons in Croke Park were treated to an enthralling battle which ultimately saw Davy Fitzgerald return the Model County to the Leinster summit after a 14 year wait.

The scenes that followed over the coming weeks showed just what Provincial glory can mean. Special mention must be made to Carlow who performed admirably on the return to the Leinster Championship, their 1st Round performance in Salthill a particular highlight. It is important now, that practical and realistic structures are in place in good time for post 2020.

The opening rounds of the Leinster Senior Football Championship served up some intriguing match ups. Louth left it late to win in Wexford, while Wicklow and Offaly gave both Kildare and Meath respective scares. The Quarter Final stages saw two double headers taking place with Dublin proving too strong for Louth and Meath likewise for Carlow.

The other side of the draw proved closer with Laois overcoming our O'Byrne Cup Champions by 2 points, while Longford staged a late comeback to force a replay with Kildare. The Lilywhites ultimately ran out victors the 5 following weekend. The Semi Final stages proved disappointing with both games being decided early on.

This set up the most traditional of Football Finals with Meath and Dublin facing off. The final itself did not live up to the billing with it proving to be one of those days for the Royal county, who I'm sure will go on to prove that day was a blip in the coming years. Having successfully retained their Leinster title Dublin duly made history by claiming their 5th All Ireland crown. An incredible achievement by a superb panel of Players and Management.

Club Championships

The AIB Club Provincial Championships have just reached their conclusion and as usual they served up great excitement and storylines.

In hurling there was a clean sweep for the Cats but St Mullins were undoubtedly the team of the Championships. Their victories over Cuala and Rathdowney-Erill added an exciting and welcome dimension to the year. In the Final they more than held their own with the reigning All Ireland Champions. In the end Shamrocks Ballyhale were worthy winners in their quest for back to back All Irelands.

The Football Championships served up similar excitement with Éire Óg and Ballyboden St Endas lighting up the early rounds. On what was a tough day for football it was Dubliners who ran out the winners just holding on over the resolute Carlow side.

The Intermediate championship through up a surprise package with Kilkenny Champions Mullinavat going further than any Nore side before. However, the ultimately came up just short against a strong Mattock Rangers side who look to be returning to their best. In the Junior Championship the victory went to the South East as Rathgarogue Cushinstown won over Clann nan Gael of Meath.

U20 Championships

With the inception of the U20 Developmental League the Leinster U20 Football Championship reverted to Winner on the Day format. There are mixed views as to the success of this League.

From a Leinster perspective we had winners in 2 of the 5 Divisions with Offaly and Laois claiming honours. The U20 scene suffers greatly from a Governance perspective, or rather lack of same. To me, it appears that at this age grade we vote one way and subsequently act another.

On the field holders Kildare fell at the first hurdle to Laois. They in turn took care of Westmeath and Meath to set up a final clash with Dublin. In a final that unfortunately failed to live up to its counterpart of the previous year, Dublin ran out comfortable victors. They went onto to ultimately lose the All Ireland in one of the games of the year.

In hurling the same format as 2018 was used the level of success and positivity achieved is all relative. Offaly hurling became energised as their young players went on a run of 4 Championship games. Having accounted for Carlow and Westmeath they took on Dublin in Parnell Park. After a titanic struggle the Offaly men had a solitary point to spare. They came up just short against Wexford in the Semi Final. Kilkenny put pay to Galway on the other side of the draw and our 3rd Kilkenny Wexford Final of the year was set up. The Noresiders this time emerged victorious. While Offaly had 4 games this year some sides only had 1.



Minor Championships

This year's Football Championship saw all 12 Counties participating. In what proved to be an inconsistent Championship. Kilkenny made the welcome return to the championship, but it ultimately proved to be just beyond their current level. I hope in time they can again re-enter the main Championship. Kildare and Dublin overcame

Laois and Westmeath respectively to set up a final clash in Navan. In a high scoring encounter, extra time was needed before Kildare were crowned Champions. In the Seamus Heaney Cup Longford retained their title with a workman like display over Wexford.

In truth, the structure of the 2019 Hurling Championship did not deliver. There is a widespread acceptance that at the current time Dublin, Kilkenny and Wexford are considerably ahead of the rest. With the exception of the Kildare and Laois game, both Tier 2 & 3 were uncompetitive. Kildare went on to have a fantastic run in the Championship defeating Offaly in the Quarter Finals and pushing Kilkenny all the way in their Semi Final.

The other side of the draw saw Wexford overcome Laois and then Dublin in a thriller to set up an age old clash. The Model County ran out winners in Croke Park by 4 points in what was an exciting game.

When it comes to Championship and Competition Structures we must always have an open mind. With particular attention being paid to demands on players, we at Leinster have changed our own structures a number of times in recent years.

One positive is the openness and honesty with which Counties assess their own abilities ahead of each season. With the current gulf in class set to continue, we may be facing into a reality of a 2 or 3 Tier Championship. If this were to be the case the 3rd Tier, at least, would have to operate on a nationwide basis.

The present situation of a second round robin is unsustainable. It is my hope that with openness and frankness we can come up with some viable alternatives. This should, now in particular, be the case with the emphasis on Minor Level being developmental. As I see it we are currently left with 2 options –

1. The top teams in Leinster, Munster and Galway all participate in All Ireland Series only. From a Leinster perspective, the remaining Counties plus Antrim, Down, Derry and Kerry would compete for the Leinster Championship.

Or

2. The second option would see Galway enter the Leinster Championship. This may not rest easy on all - including myself - shoulders. Presently Galway have a distinct advantage when it comes to the Celtic Challenge and Minor grades. I believe that were Galway to participate in Leinster the All Ireland Semi Finals be abolished, with the final being a straight contest between Leinster and Munster winners. This would mean the revamp of our own Championship in its entirety but so be it.

Myself, I would question the validity of All Irelands as we know them for this age group. With the move towards a more development mindset we could well look to the Celtic Challenge Model for a positive Template.

Junior Football

This year saw 6 Counties participating in the Junior Football Championship. This resulted in another Kildare Meath Final. In what, it must be said, was an entertaining final it was the Royals who ran out victors by 2 points.

This Championship is one that attracts little or no interest from both spectators and participating Counties alike, and yet we persist. It was, this year, the recommendation of Leinster CCC that it be discontinued. There has also recently been calls for an U23 grade here, which would run concurrently with the Senior Championships. Whether there are changes in the immediate future remains to be seen, currently we are where we are!



Urban Rural Issues

It is predicted that the population in the east of the country will grow by an additional 500,000 people by 2030. This is now just a decade away and it is imperative we as an organisation begin to plan for that challenge. National and local government planning and development policies are now focused on providing residential housing in well-serviced urban areas and this is and will create difficulties for local communities and not least the GAA Clubs.

Under the Chairmanship of Pat Teehan our own Urban/Rural Committee has identified the challenge and engaged with senior officials in the Dept of Rural Community Development this year and outlined in particular the importance of sustaining clubs in rural areas as they create activity and keep these communities vibrant.

The committee has also collaborated with the National Community Development Urban-Rural Committee on their demographic pilot study ongoing in Westmeath. That committee is piloting a GIS Mapping Tool that is linked to CSO data and will ultimately give us a better understanding of the profile of our communities and participation in the GAA.

This project highlights how this is a national issue primarily but equally we locally in the province have a role to play and we should be proactive in engaging with local agencies and influencing the provision of playing fields for our games and youth.

It is essential sport is accessible to our youth and with society becoming more urbanised we need to ensure our great games are sustained in these areas too. In this regard we need to be innovative in meeting our future infrastructure needs and also practical and not over-develop in areas when perhaps sharing with partners internally and externally is the better way.

Our committee long identified a good games programme as being essential and to this end be that at club or schools level we need facilities to provide a meaningful programme and season of games - but in a targeted way. I would urge County Committees to reflect on their own situation and think ahead to ten years' time and start planning now. With a number of County Development Plans up for review opportunities exist to engage with Local Authorities.



Reports & Changes

The Fixtures Task Force issued its Report in November 2019. There are occasions when we set the bar so high it is impossible for a Report to satisfy our expectations. Perhaps this was the case with the most recent Report. Nevertheless of the 32 proposals many of them are of the practical nature. Similar to other Reports it is unfortunate that we are still relying so heavily on Congress to give the implementer to policy, rather than Central Council.

The Report contains two proposals re Inter County Football with particular emphasis on the provincial structure. Yes if we could have a blank canvass we would more than likely go with 4 regions of 8 counties each. However this would not necessarily result in equal population basis. Such a divide could be well suited to football but hardly for hurling!

Reference is made from time to time of vested interests by the provincial councils. This charge at the provinces does not reflect the reality - Provinces exist because the counties (to date) want it that way. There is much more to a provincial council than inter county championships. Perhaps the range of shared services that a province provides to its respective counties, clubs and education sector is the fundamental reason there is no inclination presently to change the current structure.

Back to the Provincial Senior Football Championship. I suggest that for our province a round robin format for counties in Division 3 and Division 4 prior to joining the Division 1 and 2 counties in the Quarter Finals is worth consideration

- it is only a few short years ago that such a motion at Congress had significant support just failing to get the needed requirement of two-thirds. Why not examine the feasibility of having the said structure for 2021.

When Convention day arrives the HR Review is anticipated to be in its concluding stages. Whether or not it was necessary to contract consultants to this exercise is questionable, but the following are definitely a must for the Association;

- Adhering to all aspects of legislation re the work place
- Effective Governance
- Reporting lines
- Know how many employees work for the Association.

It is vital that once and for all our HR department at National level is adequately staffed to provide the necessary service to the Association across the country.

Since June the Talent Academy and Player Development Report has been in the public domain. At times there was a danger that it would be swamped by the relatively long running saga of Age Grades. Hopefully the Age Grades issue will be finally legislated this year. The Association must accept, for a variety of reasons, that a clean break between Juvenile (Under 17) and Adult is in the best interest of our players. Furthermore we are excellent at publishing Reports, but in many cases that is as far as they get. The Report gives much food for thought. It is the blueprint to ensure that as many Juveniles and young adults participate and enjoy our games.



Games Development

2019 was a significant year for Leinster GAA Games Development with notable growth across our three focus areas - club support, providing games opportunities and coach development.

Our TURAS club support program has had a major impact in only its second year of existence. It has enabled us to interact with 3,000 club coaches around the province. In this model our staff hold regional workshops where age appropriate coaching, utilising the 5 TURAS Principles are outlined.

These Principles in question are;
T - Testing & Challenging: All players should be challenged to improve at their level,
U - Understands the player is at the centre of the game and provides individualised development
R - Resembles the gaem (game base)
A - All players involved, all the time, lots of touches, lots of decisions
S - Should be an enjoyable, developmentally appropriate and holistic GAA experience

Coaches who attend these workshops are then supported in their clubs on at least two more occasions. Thus by engaging on a one to one level with our staff it is hoped that practical advice can be given to the teams they are working with.

Clubs are hugely appreciative of the increased presence of our staff on their pitches from week to week and seeing the benefits of more informal coach education supports.

A comprehensive reporting system has been created to track this large volume of work, allowing us to critically assess our impact on a club by club basis around the province. and help us to support the backbone of the association - our clubs!

As a finale to the years' work in this sector, our Games Development team held two provincial workshops in the new indoor arena at the National Sports Campus in Abbotsstown. Both these days were coach education of the highest quality in a world class sports arena and the feedback from coaches has been phenomenal. The TURAS club support programme will continue to grow in the coming years

Another aspect of the TURAS programme is to focus on educating coaches at Academy Squad and County minor level, using the 5 TURAS Principles to promote a player centred approach in place of a "win at all costs" approach.

Each county has appointed a member of staff as Talent Development Leader to oversee this coach development in their county and we are seeing great improvement in this area around the province.

In November all county minor management and a selection of those coaches working at Academy Squad level were invited to attend the Leinster GAA Talent Development seminar, in the Tullamore court hotel over two days. Drawing on the excellent knowledge of presenters Áine McNamara, Niall Corcoran, David Gough, James Owens, Jack Cooney along with our own staff members, coaches were wholesome in their praise for the seminar and we plan on this becoming an annual fixture in our coach education calendar.

Such an open forum for coaches from competing counties to share ideas is a first at minor level in the organisation and is an indication of a refreshing changing approach to coach education in our games. Having reviewed the Talent Academy & Player Development Framework recently published by Úachtarán John Horan, we are confident that much of the work being carried out in this area is aligned to the recommendations, however we look forward to a more structured implementation of the same in 2020.

Our greatest challenge at youth level continues to be one of providing a consistent season long games program in all our counties. The number of clubs and the strength of both codes in certain counties make this problematic to achieve which has led us to the creation of our Leinster Cross County league



at U13 & U15 level. In 2019 over 200 Teams took part across both codes. While we see a continued growth in entry every year, we would love to a much greater uptake in clubs increasing the length of their season to combat player drop out.

As with every year our hardworking schools' fixtures team of Noel Delaney, Tadhg Doran, Hannah Horan & Pat Henderson are busy providing a huge programme of games to youth players from September right through until May.

Huge thanks are due to the many teachers who give up so much of their time in this area. Thanks also to the many different key holders at a variety of venues all over Leinster. In excess of 1600 games involving 224 schools are played in Post Primary Schools competitions throughout the year in Leinster.

Other competitions that fall under the remit of Games Development to deliver include Celtic Challenge, Talent Academy Games Program, National Féile, and Regional Féile & Leinster Adult Hurling League. While this leads to a large demand on staff time, all are crucial to supplementing the programme of games in place by counties and enhance the offering to players aged 13 – adult.

The Kelloggs Cúl Camps continue to be the national flagship project for the recruitment and retention of players. The last decade has seen remarkable year-on year growth in participation.

A record 154,868 children took part in 2019 with Leinster accounting for 55,752 (36%) of the total figure. With such large-scale numbers, challenges around coach to child ratios are proving more difficult each year and we are certainly close to reaching our maximum numbers.

In 2019 a more competitive workplace led to a difficulty in many counties recruiting the number of coaches required while other venues simply did not have the facilities (pitch space, dressing room space, toilets etc) to cater for another increase in numbers leading to many camps limiting their numbers. Sustaining our current numbers and less of an expectation on increases will be the focus for 2020.

On a similar theme, we continue to support national projects such as 5 Star Centres, Super Games, Future Leaders and World Games at both provincial and county level on an ongoing basis.

This year will mark the end of Pat Daly's role as National Director of Games and we would like to acknowledge the huge support he has been to our counties over the last number of decades. Pats vision for the role has been outstanding and his work rate was insatiable during his countless visits to our counties.

Overall staff numbers have increased in the province in 2019 with all counties adding to, or seeing a change in personal within their staff. This provides time demands around recruitment and staff training on an ongoing basis but must be seen as a positive in improving our service to clubs, schools and counties.

An increase in spending at National, Provincial & County level always brings our pursuit of value for money into focus which has lead us to providing robust yearly reports on each county.

Games Development covers a wide variety of activity in each county often with areas going unnoticed or unreported to the relevant stakeholders and we would encourage all county executives to familiarise themselves with these reports.

Huge efforts has been undertaken by our Games Managers and their committed teams of workers and we thank them for their continued commitment to their work.



Learning & Development

The aim of learning and development for Games Development in Leinster is to continuously strive to upskill our full time staff who in turn develop and up skill our coaches, players, parents and officials. Each year we complete a training needs analysis for all staff to establish what supports they require to assist them in meeting their goals and objectives. These supports can be generic across all staff or bespoke to individuals, but all are specific that meet the overall purpose of ensuring that our staff are in the best possible position to support and develop the volunteers working within our clubs, schools and academies throughout the province.

Staff Training

Leinster GAA provide the Coaching Ireland Level 1 Coach Developer training for new staff. This course takes significant time and resources but is essential for developing staff to both deliver courses and to support coaches in their clubs. 36 staff members completed the course in 2019 and there is another 27 have started the course last December and will complete it in 2020

In 2019 we once again provided In-service for all staff on the delivery of the TURAS program. This is one of the key projects in the province and will continue to be a key part of the CPD (Continuing Professional Development) training for staff. Working with and supporting coaches is key and an important part of this is for coaches and clubs to be aware of what is available to them. With this in mind we have provided training to assist staff in communicating their offering to coaches through tailored social media training specific to their needs

Biannually we provide refresher courses in the area of sports first aid training to all Games Development staff. This year we also offered this training to Cúl camp coordinators meaning that Leinster GAA trained up 147 full time and part time staff as qualified sports first aiders

Leinster GAA once again hosted the Leadership & Management course for both staff and volunteers from around the Province. This is the fourth year of this collaboration with IT Carlow, with the feedback once again highlighting the benefits to all those who attended.

Coach Education

Tutor Training – Over 100 tutors in Leinster have completed the in-service training to be able to deliver the new content for the newly launched Introduction to Gaelic Games Coaching. This is the new introductory coaching course that has been designed in partnership between the GAA, The LGFA and Camogie Association. This course will mean all the newly qualified coaches will now be fully recognised by all organisations.

Leinster GAA have once again been to the forefront in the delivery of foundation, Award 1 and Award 2 courses. In 2019 there was 145 foundation course, 49 Award 1 courses and 5 Award courses scheduled

In 2019 Leinster GAA launched our first Webinar series. This was well received not only by coaches in Leinster but also coaches from many other provinces and overseas units. The level of engagement has shown that coaches are always looking to learn and develop, it is our challenge to find new ways to support them and assist them knowing that time is precious. It is up to us in Leinster

GAA to continue to strive to find new ways of supporting coaches with the technologies now available to us.

In 2019 Leinster GAA continued to develop and roll out bespoke courses and workshops to coaches around the province. We continue to deliver the Leinster GAA Youth Resistance Training Course and the Introduction to Performance Analysis course but this year we added two additional workshops to the menu, “In Season Fitness for Gaelic Games” & “Plan to perform”. These workshops were developed and delivered by staff in the province and will be available to club, school and academy coaches on an ongoing basis in 2020.



Fixtures Analysis

Our Fixtures Analyst Committee have made a number of observations throughout the year. My thanks must go to Michael O'Brien and Alan Mulhall for their work in what can only be described as a tricky area.

Firstly with regard to the introduction of the Tier 2 in the football championship. It is their belief that the fixtures window within Counties will not be greatly affected. The reason being that their will only be a small addition to the time period already in place to run the Qualifiers.

However, Tier 2 does highlight one other concern. There could well be a reluctance to release county players for clubs fixtures. This is due to the heightened importance the league now holds for those in Division 2 and 3 in particular. How best to deal with this issue is not quite clear.

The decision to bring the All Ireland Club Championships creates concern for a number of counties. Some counties are now of the belief that they will struggle to finish their own Championships in time. This is a legitimate concern. However, one possible solution could be the moving of some games to finish on the day. The removal of possible replays at certain stages would give a concrete (barring weather) finish time to all Championships. If we wish to move towards a more certain fixtures calendar then this is one nettle we all need to grasp.

The U20 Inter County Competitions or rather the uncertainty around the same continue to cause problems at club level. Providing adequate games at a suitable time of the year is always a struggle. This is made increasingly difficult when 2nd Level and 3rd Level begin to be taken into account.

Until this is rectified in a concrete manner these struggles will remain in place. The use of April as a club month is having a mixed reaction. Most continues to their credit, are using the window to provide league activity.

However, the lack of willingness to start Championships here may be one of the reasons counties struggle to finish in time. The gap between this and the concluding stages of the Championships is the abiding issue.

Fixtures remain a consistent issue within the organisation. I often question whether there will ever be a programme that there is consensus on. I doubt there is but we must continue to make improvements where we can.



Games For All

Wheelchair Hurling

This year proved to be a challenging one for our Wheelchair hurling team in both the League and the All Ireland Championship held in Abbotstown. Up and down results meant the League came down to a winner takes all clash in Newport between ourselves and Ulster. A last minute equaliser was not enough as the point proved decisive in clinching the title for the northern side. Munster ultimately won out in the Championship. Many thanks must be paid to all whose hard work ensure the success of this team remain and ongoing pursuit, in particular those who train collectively in Mountmellick every Thursday.

Royal Visit

This May the GAA were honoured to host King Carl XVI and Queen Silvia of Sweden at Croke Park. Here in partnership with the Central Community and Health Department our Committee organised an exhibition of all activities within the Games for All remit. This included the ever successful Fun & Run project. This gave both children and parents/guardians the chance to grace the hallowed grass, an opportunity that they would not previously have had.

Inclusivity Camps

This year has seen a huge increase in the number of Inclusion Camps being provided within the Province. I wish to commend both our Counties and Games for All Committee for the provision of such a vital asset to schools, ASD Units, Clubs and Parents. The impact these camps have on attendees cannot be undersold. One such example our Committee's 3rd Annual Camp at

the Dundalk Sports Centre. In total 35 children ranging from 6-16 were catered for with a whole host of activities, ranging from Floorball to "Have a Go" session. Thanks must go to both the Louth Sports Partnership and Irish Wheelchair Association for their ongoing support in the provision of these activities.

Towards the end of the year our Committee worked in partnership with Kilkenny GAA to provide GAA based coaching for a multi sports club in the Watershed Sports Centre. This camp has been ongoing for a number of years, being run by IWA and the Kilkenny Sport and Recreation Partnership. This club is open to individuals of all ages with intellectual, learning and integration difficulties. A thanks here must go to Brian Cody and the Kilkenny GAA Executive who attended the most recent training session. Here our Provincial Wheelchair Hurling team provided and exhibition. It is hoped that in time, this club can act as another feeder thread for our Provincial Team.

In total 9 of our Counties provided Camps based around inclusion and Games for All. We are moving the right direction in ensuring that we truly leave up to the mantra of being an Association "Where We All Belong".

The on going work of this Committee does not go unnoticed in particular to Cathaoirleach Pat Lynagh and Runai Brian Carberry. A special thanks also to our National Committee and Brian Armitage and Tony Watene whose encouragement and guidance throughout the year proved invaluable.





Health & Well-Being

Health and Wellbeing is increasingly becoming a significant area of work within our organisation. It can be loosely described as the achievement and maintenance of physical fitness and mental stability. As such our Committee has for the past year worked hand in hand with County Committee's to ensure the Province as a whole is provided for on this level.

This was carried out through a simple Action Plan being devised for the year which saw regular meetings occur right across the Province. One such action from this plan was the provision of Health Club Officer training. As I mentioned with regard to club officer retention, the more that we can do to assist volunteers stay within our organisation the better.

Another key area that the Committee, under the guidance of Brain Carberry and John McCarthy, worked on in 2019 was the development of links with Sports Partnerships and the Health Service Authority. The more we can build cross organisational partnerships such as these the better for our members. By becoming exposed to best practice in the area of Wellbeing in particular, we can pass this expertise onto our Counties and Clubs.

This year saw the GAA launch TILDA (The Irish Longitudinal Study on Ageing). The aim of this significant study is to make Ireland the world the best place in the world to grow old. This work in partnership with Trinity College seeks to find ways to assist our aging population.

This is a significant piece of work from our point of view within the GAA. For a majority of the time our focus can be taken up by children participating and the younger generations, but it is important to remember that a vast cohort of our membership would fall into the category that TILDA is looking to provide for.

Mental health has never been of more importance than at the present time. As such I was heartened to see our Committee partner with the Tony Fenton Foundation. Together they organised "Men's Health Nights" in local clubs. These nights look to encourage men to explore and health concerns they may have in a relaxed and sociable setting. The more recent of these was organised in conjunction with Carlow Health and Wellbeing Committee. I hope that we can build on the early successes of this initiative in 2020.

In the past we would have been reluctant to move into the area of Health. However, it is worth noting that there a similar number of GP's across the Country as GAA Clubs. We as a body, can provide a new way in which to deliver health promotion and interventions. If it even only makes a difference to a small number it will be worth it.

Hearings

2019 as with many other years was a busy one for our Leinster Hearings & Disciplinary Committee. In total 11 Hearings were carried out with 16 appeals. In total 14 of these appeals were ruled out of order and were never heard. In total 2 of our Leinster cases ended up with the CAC (Central Appeals Committee) and the DRA (Dispute Resolution Authority). One of these cases in particular placed extra duress on our Committee of volunteers as it required 6 meetings in total spread from Portlaoise to Cavan and Dublin. This allied to the increasing demand for hearings and appeals to be heard at short notice, leave one with the view that a complete review of our disciplinary process may be required.

Last year the issue around lack of knowledge of rulings was raised both in this report and at convention. Since then only one county has been forthcoming in asking our Committee for a workshop. This is something that will need to be addressed in the coming year as a continued basic lack of ruling knowledge is creating unnecessary work for many volunteers at both County, Provincial and indeed National level.

The support we provide to both our CCC and Hearings Committee's needs to be addressed. Increasingly clubs and counties are calling on the support of external law practitioners to assist them. This increases the ever growing level of pressure on our volunteers, while ultimately leading to an appeal culture. The inability to accept even the most lenient of rulings is one which all of us within the association need to address internally.

A special word of thanks to Cathaiorleach Dick Butler and Runai John Byrne under whose guidance the Committee performed admirably throughout the year. Michael Delaney was welcomed onto the Committee as incoming Chairman in order to ensure a smooth transition next year. This period of transition worked well and is one that may be worth pursuing with other Committee's in the future.

A final note must mention our colleague Michael Murphy of Wicklow who we sadly lost during the year. Michael was a great servant to both County and Province and we extend our condolences to his family. Ar dheis Dé do raibh a anam.



Ardoideachais Laighean

Higher Education plays an invaluable role in our young players lives as they manage the transition from Post Primary School. The Higher Education GAA Club differs from your traditional home Clubs in that it provides a positive environment for students to engage with their peers. To this end the games offered both ourselves and the National Committee play a significant role in our Players Developmental Pathway. It is important that this significance is remembered as we look to a new fixtures Calendar for 2020 and beyond.

To the games themselves. Many thanks must be offered to our Cathaoirleach Ciaran Flynn and his Committee for the work they have and continue to carry out. Not all of our Higher Education teams get to represent their college at National Level. As such we have introduced a number of competitions to fill this void. Our Junior Football Championship is one such competition. This year saw it run on a knockout basis with 7 teams entering. The final as contested between DKIT and DCU with the Dublin side emerging victorious. Our Intermediate Hurling League consisted of 6 teams with the final being held in the National Games Development Centre in Abottstown. GMIT ultimately ran out victorious.

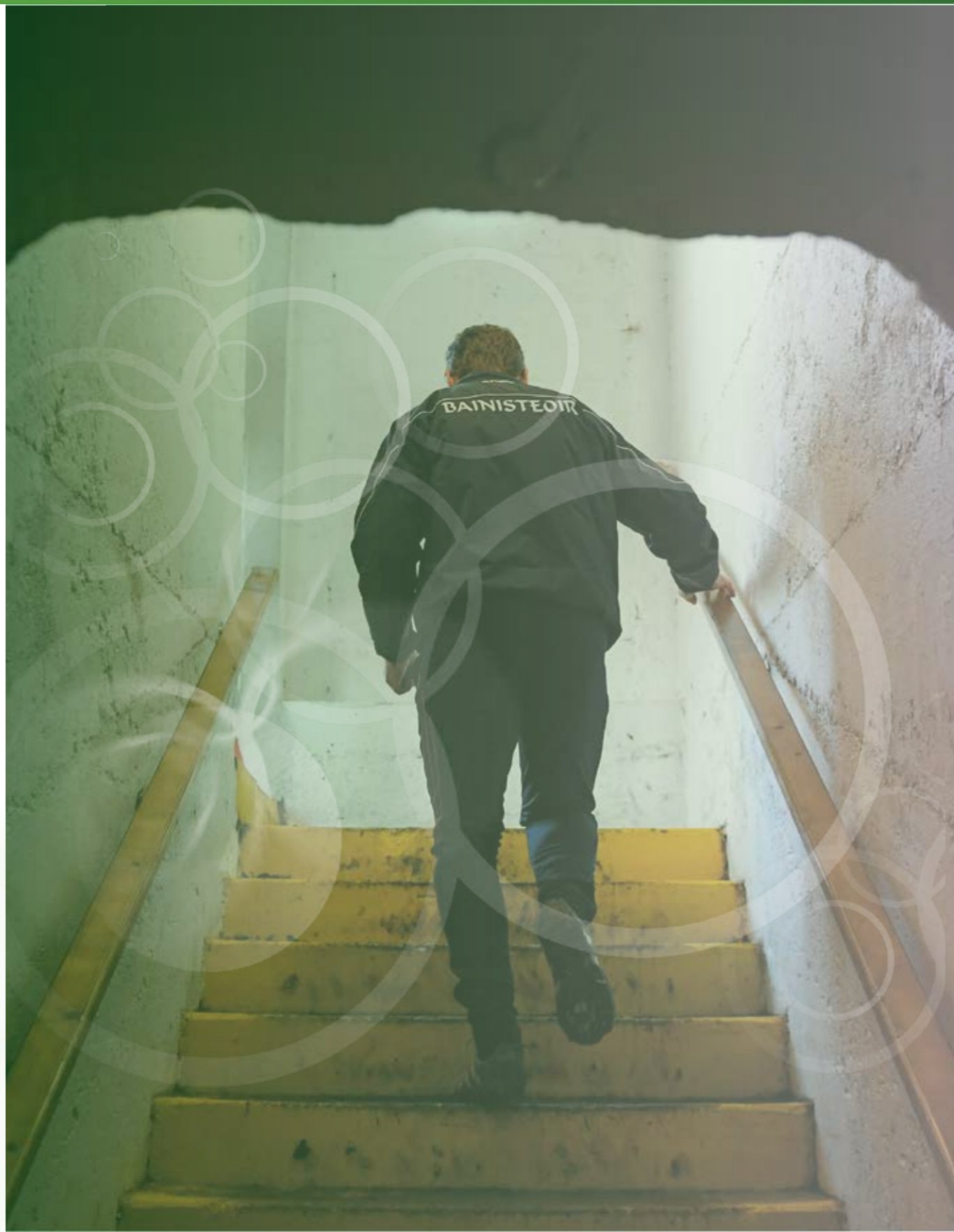
One of the highlights of the calendar year is our Bursary Awards presentation night. This gives us, in Comhairle Laighean, a chance to recognise the hard work being carried out by the younger generations of our Association.

In its 15th year this is a support we are only too happy to give and 2019 saw us once again award 30,000 in bursaries. It is hoped that this support will further encourage these young adults to become involved in administration, refereeing and coaching in the future.

It, as with all our activities, is worth noting the contribution of our officials. Without the ongoing support of referees these games and many others simply could not go ahead. It is imperative that these vital components of our games are treated with the upmost respect by both players and coaches alike. These games could not go ahead without organisation, as such I would like to thank our servicing officer Brendan Connolly. Brendan carries a significant body of work throughout the year, especially in securing venues at the most inopportune times of the year. This work does not go unnoticed and on behalf of the Ardoideacais I wish Brendan continued success into the future.

A further word of thanks must also go to the National sponsors Electrical Ireland. As with all our partners their impact has not gone unnoticed. The increased exposure you bring to our games is greatly appreciated and we hope is something that will continue long into the future.





Infrastructure & Safety

2019 was a busy year for our Infrastructure, Safety and Insurance Committee with responsibilities including; assisting and supporting Clubs & Counties with their Club Physical Development(s) i.e Grant Applications, Strategic Club Planning Programmes, Land Acquisitions and facilitating Safety Inspections & Insurance queries as necessary.

This year as with recent years, showed an increase in the number of clubs applying and receiving club grant allocations. This increase was in the region of 40%. One hundred and forty four Clubs shared a total of 1.2 million (an increase of circa 17% on 2018 funding allocation) in Development Grants with Ard Chomhairle contributing 850,000.00 and to ensure the percentage set from previous years was maintained, Comhairle Laighean also contributed. Educational entities shared a total of 95,000.00. At this stage I must acknowledge Ard Chomhairle's increase and continued support in this regard.

As in previous years the trend continued with Clubs seeking to purchase land to provide additional playing facilities for all members. A number of Clubs completed transactions during 2019, with a large number of developments still in progress. In the main, the Association fortunately is acquiring such land at agricultural values however, it may be reality that a small number of clubs have paid over the odds.

For a variety of reasons including identity and economy of scale, it must be emphasised that purchasing additional land adjacent to a Club's present facilities is preferable to having to purchase elsewhere. Not only should land purchase(s) be fit for purpose, but transactions must also be financial sustainable on a long term basis.

Notwithstanding Ard Chomhairle's increase of funding for 2019, with the number and scale of developments increasing in recent years and likewise anticipated for the coming year(s) our allocation of funding is more important than ever and is still possibly falling short of expectation. This Committee in whatever guise will certainly continue to put forward a strong business case again in 2020 for additional funding to allow us continue assisting clubs with their development of facilities which are deemed necessary, fit for purpose and value for money.

Some major projects were completed during the year and many others commenced and great credit to all involved. Laois have completed their Centre of Excellence (3 pitches) including dressing rooms, gym, administration and catering facilities. Kildare GAA is also progressing with their redevelopment of St Conleth's Park in Newbridge. Pearse Park in Longford completed the final phase of their safety works on their stand and credit must be given to all involved. Louth GAA are also making progress following their purchase of a 10 acre site to accommodate the building of a 14,000 capacity stadium close to Dundalk IT. Meath GAA received full planning permission in 2018 for a 21,000 seater redevelopment of Pairc Tailteann in Navan and are currently progressing with same. Westmeath GAA are exploring options available

to them in terms of what development would serve them best to facilitate the needs of all their County teams. This includes upgrade works in Cusack Park and the possibility of purchasing additional lands to develop a Centre for Excellence. Kilkenny GAA also further enhanced their Centre of Excellence with the additional infrastructure works to their already impressive facilities at Dunmore Training Centre.

The Committee also visited other Counties that have plans in place for their forthcoming projects in 2020 and we endeavour to continue providing support and advice in relation to same. The most recent tranch of funding released in the Sports Capital Grants mean that 2020 looks like it will be another productive and rewarding year for all involved.



Our safety personnel had another busy year, as they continued carrying out general safety inspections in many Counties including club grant inspections. Great credit to all involved and it was evident in most clubs that safety is to the fore. However, we highlighted some serious faults in a small number of grounds where immediate action was required and a follow up visits are planned for the forthcoming year. Furthermore, our safety personnel will be visiting all Counties in the months to come with a view to delivering safety workshops and information sessions.

I would not be wrong in stating that we in Leinster have set a trend for the remainder of the Country in addressing safety issues at venues. For instance the safety checklist that was devised by our Committee is now a template in use across the country.

Our vision now is to further enhance this initiative and help clubs and Counties promote a safety culture within their respective grounds and try getting all relevant personnel to value safety. Furthermore, it is envisaged that we will liaise with our National Health & Safety Committee members in rolling out the 'Safe Club Initiative' to Counties within Leinster.

It is in our own interest as an organisation to ensure that all units operate to the highest standards possible and while we tend to focus on the 'bigger games', it is important that we are Safety conscious at all levels.

From an Insurance perspective our Association may be facing into some major obstacles in the months and years ahead. The legal system is and increasing myriad of challenges due in no small part to the fact we are no longer an association who simply play Galeic Games.

While we can all welcome the continued development facilities within our association there may well be some unforeseen risks in doing so. The more these facilities cost in upgrading them the greater the need for them to self-generate income. This can lead to many hosting non GAA activity which in turn brings a new range of issues. Our Committees experience thus far have led us to the realisation that in court if it is not written down it did not happen. A vast number of the claims that we have been privy to have highlighted that we are failing to adequately manage facilities and activities in the following ways;

- H&S statements inadequate or non-existent
- Recording keeping limited or non-existent
- Not requesting Proof of Insurance from Users (Indemnity)
- Limited if any paper trail
- No Provision for Maintenance / Upkeep or Replacement

The Associations Liability claims experience sees cost & numbers of incidents rising annually. In conclusion it is not necessarily the development and use of our facilities that is creating these problems, but rather our management of them. If this mismanagement of facilities continues it may set a worrying trend which could threaten the Associations ability to obtain adequate insurance cover in the future

As a result a number of Insurance personnel from our committee will be teaming up with our safety team to deliver workshops and information sessions to all Counties. It is hoped that by communicating with and supporting clubs to this end we will gradually reverse this alarming trend. I would strongly encourage all personnel to take ownership over this issue before it becomes unmanageable.

A Special thanks got to all members A Special thanks got to all members of this Committee as the work carried out is of vital importance and too often unseen. To our Cathaoirleach P.J. Kelly and all members I offer my appreciation of your time and effort.

Scór Laighean

This year was a significant one for our Scór Laighean Committee under the dutiful guidance of Cathaoirleach Caitriona Ui Dhalaiigh and Runai Aine Ni Chinneide. For 2019 marked the 50th Anniversary of Scór Laighean. As such a number of events were held throughout the year to mark this milestone.

These events culminated in a celebration concert being held in the Midlands Park Hotel, Portlaoise. This concert saw Scór participants past and present come together for a wonderful night of song, music and dance. In attendance on the night was Cathaoirleach Scór Naisiunta Aodhan O Braonain and our own Cathaoirleach Seamus O Bhuilgdir.

2019 also saw us welcome Netwatch as Title sponsors of Scór Laighean. Their support has already made a notable difference. We very much look forward to the coming years of the partnership as they support a vital part of the associations' heritage.

This year saw our Scór Sinsir Laighean and Scór na nOg take place in the National Opera House in Wexford. The fantastic setting was perfectly aligned to the talent on display. This year we had winners from right across the Province in all events with two Offaly clubs going onto National success. Kilkcormac Killoughey claiming the Ceol Uirlise title and Ferbane taking the Ballad Group title at the All Ireland's in Castlebar Co. Mayo.

In May of this year representatives from Scór Laighean attended a National Forum at Croke Park. Here there were stringant discussions about the future direction of Scór.

Several new rule changes have been introduced and will be in place from 2020 onwards. I would like to thank Caitriona, Aine and all the Committee for their continued hard work and commitment to the future of Scór Laighean itself.



Cumann na nBunscol

As with all years 2019 proved to be a busy one for our Cumann na nBunscol Committee. All 12 Counties have extremely active Cumann na nBunscol units, and the activities being provided have significantly grown in number. At a meeting in November each of these units provided a report on activity to date, with all placing a heavy emphasis on the promotion of our games.

The young whistler programme continues to go from strength to strength. This year training was provided in 5 Counties across April and May. Each of these young referee's were subsequently used to referee mini games throughout our Championships. In a similar vein referee's from Dublin and Louth were used at our Provincial Go Games days in Croke Park. Programmes like this are brilliant for introducing children to the skills required to referee. However, whether we are currently doing enough to retain these young officials is another matter. It is one that hopefully we can all look to address in the coming years.

The mini games programme was once again a resounding success. These games add great value to our main Championships. I would like to thank our Runaí Gerry O'Meara in particular for his help in organising these. We had games on 20 separate days and at 9 different venues. These days could also not be possible without the support of parents and teachers alike, the difference this experience can make in the retention of players cannot be understated. In total over 500 children participated with all having their names printed in the matchday programme. We look forward to continuing this activity in 2020.

A number of individual activity days and camps were held right throughout the Province. These activities continue to provide a variety to the traditional Games Programme and ensures all children are catered for. Events such as the Carlow Lift & Strike, Laois Boys & Girls Blitz days and the Dublin Girls Tournament in DCU are great examples of just this.

This year also saw the successful running of the Twinning Project. This saw 2 Counties come together to run a combined day of activity. Louth and Meath had a combined football day, while Offaly and Laois came together on the hurling front. Again this is another variety to the traditional programme which can open children up to the larger GAA community. Our thanks to Ronan McKenna, Nolaig O'Neill Forde, Declan Ward and Shane Maher for co-ordinating.

I would like to pay particular tribute this year. To the active work being done in counties with regards to promotion of their activities. Their active social networking and engagement with local media in particular, go a long way towards promotion our organisation as a whole. If we give those being introduced to our games a beneficial experience we go a long way towards retaining them as lifelong members.





Post Primary Schools

The 2018/2019 school year had a number of highlights, while also presenting various challenges throughout the year. St Kieran's College regained the Corn Ui Dhuill SH "A" trophy at the expense of Colaiste Eoin in a very entertaining Final in O'Moore Park. Naas CBS retained the Bro Bosco Cup SF "A" with a thrilling win after extra time over Wicklow Schools in Parnell Park. As mentioned in last year's report, this certainly gives encouragement for other schools to follow suit and take the step up in grade where possible. Castlecomer CS came out on top in a very competitive SH "B" Championship with Ashbourne CS taking the SF "B" honours. To all our winners, provincial and regional, I extend congratulations.

All our provincial winners went on to represent themselves and the province with great distinction at All Ireland level. Unfortunately, last year's tally of 5 titles could not be matched! 2018-19 saw only one All Ireland title return to the province - St. Kieran's College winning their fifth All Ireland title in six years, a remarkable achievement for all concerned.

The past school year saw a number of our competitions been delayed, for various reasons. This is, understandably, very frustrating on the team and mentors that are forced into long delays out of their control. The ever-changing school environment, e.g. class based assessments, has made completing our fixture programme on schedule very difficult. While understanding that these delays are more often than not out of the mentor's control, all concerned parties must continually

review and try put in place procedures to avoid these delays. Definite deadlines etc may have to be put in place. In order to meet All Ireland dates in certain competitions we had to request schools to play 2/3 times in one week. This is far from ideal or fair, but we are grateful to those that helped us out.

My thanks to all the schools and teachers for their understanding and co-operation. As stated, at times it was very frustrating for all concerned. All the above, plus weather etc, is something we need to be aware of when deciding on dates, formats etc. Planning and communication is the key!!

During the year our long serving colleague Tom O'Donnell retired. Tom's knowledge and guidance will be missed and was reflected by the number of well wishes sent in. To Tom, Pat Henderson Noel Delaney, Tadhg Doran and Hannah Horan, my thanks for all the help and hard work throughout the year. Thanks to our Cathaoirleach Des Halpenny who was also a great source of advice and help. My thanks also to the various county coaching & games personnel for all your assistance and work. It is very much appreciated. Thanks to all the teachers and coaches who are helping to keep GAA alive and continuing to grow in our schools. Your time and work is appreciated especially in the challenging and changing times in our schools. As mentioned above, we are indebted to the clubs and county boards who make their facilities available to us, some often at short notice. Our games would not be an event but for the venues and officials we use - because of the large programme of Gaelic Games - third level, second level, primary level, hurling, football, camogie, ladies' football - it is not always as easy as anticipated to arrange venues and referees.

As always, we will endeavour to review any feedback to learn and improve matters where possible. I'm glad to say that Comhairle Iarbhunskoileanna Laighean and Leinster GAA Games Development are actively and regularly reviewing our competition structures etc. The proposal to go to 1st & 2nd Year competitions in lieu of Juvenile is evident of this and comes on the back of strong opinion at last year's Schools AGM.

A special word of thanks to our sponsors Top Oil for your assistance and for helping promote our games. Hopefully our link will continue for many more years to come.

PR & Marketing

Digital Content and Championships

In terms of our Marketing and Promotion within the Province 2019 was an extremely busy one. The year itself saw our focus shift slightly to a more digitalised approach to promotion. We had trialled this approach during the 2018 Club Championships and in particular our coverage of matchday activity. This is reflected in our online Social Media following as it continues to grow, now totalling almost 60 thousand across all platforms. Not only this but we are currently averaging over 21 thousand view per month on our home pages.

One example of this new way of thinking was our approach to promoting our flagship Senior Championship Finals. Two live roadshows were held in both Meath and Wexford ahead of both finals. These roadshows were live streamed on our Facebook pages reaching an audience of over 15 thousand. These roadshows were a ground-breaking moment as similar had never been tried at a Provincial level. It reinforces our continued commitment to being at the fore front of Digital Content in our area. Many thanks must go to the past players who participated in these roadshows and it is something we hope to build on in the future.

Our traditional Championship launch this year was a resounding success. This was due in no small way to the Defence Forces for their use of Casement Aerodrome Baldonnel. Their support in running this event was second to none.

The launch itself received extensive coverage and was the lead on the main six-one sports bulletin that night. A thanks also to the media for their continued support and coverage of our games. The Championships themselves were another highlight of the year. In total the attendance for both Senior Championship comes in at over 260 thousand which see's us remain in line with last season despite not having a replayed final this year.

Chadwicks Club Hurling League

2019 also saw us welcome a new sponsor to the Province in the form of Chadwicks. They have come on board as title sponsor of our Leinster Club Hurling League. Year one of the partnership was a resounding success with over 50 teams participating, and 3 of the 4 Finals being played as double headers with Senior Inter County Games. To mark the partnership a "Kit Out Competition" was run, to assist clubs carrying out renovation work on their facilities. A huge number of clubs applied, and 12 county winners received a 1,000 voucher for Chadwicks. The overall winner of the competition was Kilmacow in Co Kilkenny. They received 10,000 worth of product from Chadwicks to assist in their dressing room renovation. Many thanks, to all who assisted in the running of this competition and to Chadwicks for the generous prizes. We look forward to 2020 and building on our partnership.

Beko Bua Programme

The return of the Beko Bua Programme for 2019 saw us build even further on this programme. A new structure saw Clubs complete and online audit before submitting a future planning form was submitted. This new structure gave us greater access to up to date data on clubs.

Top Oil Post Primary Schools

2019 saw our most active year in terms of social engagement when it came to 2nd level schools. The intiation of our Player of the Round Awards and Video content were well received. The streaming of both finals was an added highlight. This was topped off by our Next Great Commentator Competiton Winner Liam Kelly O'Rourke doing a phenomenal job. Liam has a bright future and I wish him all the best.

Many thanks as always to Top Oil for their continued support it is a partnership that is flourishing.

Shared Services

Our team also assisted in the recruitment of new staff across the province by creating Promotional Videos based around Games Development Staff. These videos proved extremely successful as we reached a new audience of applicants. The benefit of these videos has been two-fold. Firstly, the quality of those applying for new positions and secondly they are highlighting the already fantastic work being carried out by existing staff, right across the Province. Next year more such videos are planned in order to further promote the work that is ongoing in all Counties.

My thanks go to our PRO Martin O'Halloran and his Committee for their work and expertise in pushing the Province forward. As stated above it is the hope that we can build on the centralised support provided to Counties while also pushing the boundaries of what we are capable of. With a number of new initiatives in place for 2020 it is sure to be an exciting year on the Promotional Side of the house.



Club Leadership & Planning

This year our Club Leadership & Planning Committee, headed by David Denieffe met on numerous occasions. The main focuses throughout the year were that of building on the activities linked with the GAA's Club Leadership Development (CLDP) and Club Planning Programmes.

This Committee in particular works extremely closely with the National Officer Development Committee (NODC) and in particular Ruairí Harvey and his team of Eoghan Tuomey and Jack McCarney in Planning and Training in Croke Park and I would like to thank them for their support throughout the year.

The Committee has been involved in identifying and supporting associates in the province with the intended aim of rolling out the CLDP programme more fully in 2020. The stated aim of the CLDP is to provide the principal GAA Club Officers - Chairperson, Secretary, Treasurer, PRO - with the basic knowledge and core leadership skills required to fulfil their roles effectively.

A key initiative undertaken was the rollout of the Pre-AGM module all counties in Leinster. This module supports the club officers in planning, running and following the AGM. Its presentation to over 300 club officers in late 2018 was met with a very positive response and was rolled out again in 2019. The elective modules in the CLDP in 2019 on Office 365, Volunteering and Club Governance also proved very popular.

The intent is to further provide these modules as counties and officers need them. The Committee actively supports Club Planning particularly in its piloting in clubs in Kilkenny, Carlow and Offaly and will be involved in facilitating this further in 2020. Training so far has been provided to almost 30 facilitators in September 2019.

A big plus to the Club Planning side of the house has been the addition of the Beka Bua Programme. This programme requires Club to an introspective look at how they operate, while also casting an eye to the future. It is hoped that in the coming year we can further link these two activities together.

For 2020 plans have already been put in place to provide further support in a number of areas. Most notably with regard to the recruitment and retention of Club Officers. This is a major issue at grass roots level as more and more people are struggling to find the time to commit to such roles.

Not only this but as our organisation comes under more and more scrutiny, there is a reluctance from amateurs to take up positions of responsibility they feel they are not qualified for. As a result it becomes imperative that we as a Province provide as much support to clubs and counties as possible to ensure these barriers are eradicated.

One such way of doing so, will be through the establishment of a network of knowledge. This will be a platform through our Committee where challenges and solutions can be discussed with Clubs to establish best practice examples. This shared knowledge can then be applied to training modules for both Volunteer Recruitment and Club Governance.

We look forward to what the year brings in this one of our most important areas.



Conclusion

At this Convention the terms of office for four of our Officers comes to an end. An Cathaoirleach, Jim Bolger during his three year term was a steady influence. I wish him well in the future particularly in the coming months.

Pat Teehan moves from Leas Cathaoirleach to Cathaoirleach. It is a proud day for Pat and his family, Club and County. I have no doubt that Pat's years in GAA administration will stand to him in good stead in the three years ahead.

Also thanks to both Pat Lynagh (Cisteoir) and Martin O Halloran (PRO), who also vacate their positions, for their contribution to the work of the province over the past three years.

Hurling

Christy O'Brien (Laois)

Christy O'Brien sailed the championship seas with Laois' flagship hurling team over the course of three decades, starting out in 1955, playing throughout the entire 1960s before docking in 1970 when making his farewell appearance as a sub, revealing in an interview with the GAA Oral History that he was on the bank that day in Birr and was called on to tog out.

During that time O'Brien made 24 championship appearances, a versatile character, as, of his 23 starts, 15 were in defence (8 was at full-back, 2 at left full back,

3 at centre-half back, 2 at left half back) and 8 in attack (7 at centre half forward, 1 at full forward).

Proof of his prowess in attack is the fact that Christy scored 11-23 (56), 11-16 from play, 0-7 from placed balls, 4-1 of that tally compiled when starting out in defence and brought forward to try and save the day. During the course of his championship career Christy contested 5 Leinster semi-finals - 1956, 1959, 1962, 1965, 1967 - suffering defeats at the hurls of Wexford (3) and Kilkenny (2).

While championship success eluded Christy and Laois, the O'Moore County did win two NHL Division 2 titles, 1959-60 and 1964-65, Christy's league career predating his championship start by a 3 years graduating from minor ranks in the early 1950s.

His outstanding hurling with Laois saw Christy selected on the Leinster Railway Cup team, playing

all his hurling with the province in attack and right well he did too, scoring 5-3 in 8 appearances including 5 finals against Munster,

the Laois man winning three Railway Cup medals on the field of play, 1962, 1964 and 1965. Christy had previously won a Railway Cup medal in 1956 when selected to play the final but forced to cry off.

In 1966 Christy, along with Bernie Hartigan of Limerick was selected to join hurling legends Christy Ring and John Doyle, both winners of 8 All-Ireland medals, to travel to America for the Cardinal Cushing Games in New York and Boston, a trip he recalls with great fondness in that Oral History interview with Regina Fitzpatrick.

Selected on the Rest of Ireland hurling team in the 1960s, his greatest individual honour came in 1984 when selected at full-forward on the Team of the Century of the greatest 15 never to have won an All-Ireland medal. Again he was in exalted company, that team reading: Seanie Duggan (Galway); Jim Fives (Waterford/Galway); Noel Drumgoole (Dublin), John Joe 'Goggles' Doyle (Clare); Sean Herbert (Limerick), Sean Stack (Clare), Colm Doran (Wexford); Joe Salmon (Galway), John 'Jobber' McGrath (Westmeath); Josie Gallagher (Galway), Martin Quigley (Wexford), Kevin Armstrong (Antrim); Jimmy Smith (Clare), Christy O'Brien (Laois), Mick Bermingham (Dublin).

Having enjoyed his first success with his school team in the late 1940s, on the club scene Christy with his beloved Borris-in-Ossory won a Laois JHC in '52, an IHC in '53 and 5 Laois SHC medals, 1956, 1957, 1960, 1961 and his swan song in 1972 when almost 40 years of age he scored 3-4 in the county final.

Ollie Crinnegan (Kildare)

Ollie Crinnegan, Kildare's first All-Star, honoured with selection as the 1978 goalkeeper, made a massive 139 competitive outings with his county senior team between 1965 and 1980, 42 of those Lilywhite appearances in the championship but alas the outstanding net guardian suffered the heartache of six Leinster SFC final defeats (1966, 1969, 1971, 1972, 1975, 1978).

Kildare and Crinnegan also lost the 1968 National League final to Down but won a National League Division 2 medal in 1974 with a victory over Dublin's emerging Heffo's Army. His only other senior inter-county medal was an O'Byrne Cup memento in 1971.

In 1965 Crinnegan played minor, U21 and senior championship football, actually playing in a minor and senior championship match on the one day. Kildare were beaten in the Leinster minor final that year but the U21's not only won Leinster but went on the win the All-Ireland title playing an exciting brand of football.

A full-back with Edenderry and Offaly Vocational School teams, Crinnegan was called on as a goalkeeper by the Kildare minor selectors for a game against Offaly and remained there ever after.

He has played Leinster SFC against all 11 other Leinster counties.

He has also played again those 11 in the NFL as well as facing all six Munster counties, Galway, Sligo and Roscommon from Connacht with Down the lone Ulster county Crinnegan played against in competitive fare. In all he played against 22 of the 32 counties as well as Warwickshire in a 1974 league play-off.
