

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EXTRA TIME AND WINNER ON THE DAY REGULATIONS

Regulations approved Ard Chomhairle on the 19th January 2019 and in accordance with Rules of Specification 3.4 & 3.6 T.O. Part 2 2019, that relevant games that finish level after normal playing times should be completed as follows:

Phase 1

Proceed to Extra time as provided for in T.O Cuid II (two periods of ten minutes each way)

Phase 2 (Penalty Kicks/Pucks)

If still level, a "penalty competition" to decide the outcome

- The relevant rules in T.O. Cuid II shall apply in relation to Penalty Kicks/Pucks, unless otherwise stated.
- Penalties will be taken for goals only.
- The Referee shall choose the end at which the penalty kicks/pucks will be taken. The end may be changed by the
 referee if it becomes unplayable during the course of the penalties.
- The Referee will ensure two goal umpires are in place at the end in which the penalty kicks/pucks are to be taken

- Both umpires shall position themselves on the end line at opposite side of the goals facing inwards

- If a penalty is scored, the goal umpire, will wave the green flag once the referee has signalled

If the penalty is saved or missed the point umpire will signal a wide once the referee has signalled

- Each team shall register five penalty takers, a goal keeper & a substitute goal keeper with the referee and indicate in
 which order the penalty takers will take their penalties. (A penalty taker can also be a goalkeeper or a substitute goalkeeper.)
- The Referee shall toss a coin in the presence of the two captains to see which team will have the option of going first.
- Only players who are on the field of play at the end of Phase 1 (i.e. end of Extra Time), shall be allowed to be registered as a
 penalty taker or goalkeeper. Exception: The substitute goalkeeper can come from the team panel.
- A goalkeeper who is injured while the penalty kicks/pucks are being taken and is unable to continue as a goalkeeper may be replaced* by the substitute goalkeeper who has been nominated in advance, provided the referee is notified. If in the event the substitute goalkeeper also gets injured, one of the registered penalty takers may replace* the substitute goalkeeper, provided the referee is notified. (*Once replaced, the goalkeeper/ substitute goalkeeper cannot be reintroduced as a goalkeeper at a later stage)
- Subject to the conditions below both teams will take five penalty kicks/pucks which are taken alternately by the teams. The game is awarded
 to whichever team scores more of their five penalty kicks/pucks

-If, before both teams have taken five penalty kicks/pucks, one team has scored more goals that the other team could score, even if they were to complete their five penalty kicks/pucks, no more penalty kicks/pucks shall be taken

-If, after both teams have taken five penalty kicks/pucks and both teams have scored the same number of goals, the penalty competition will continue but in sudden death format using the same five registered players until one team has scored a goal more than the other from the same number of kicks/pucks.

-In sudden death, the same sequence of penalty takers does not have to be followed as in the first round of penalty kicks/pucks.

- Each penalty kick/puck is taken by a different player. All registered players must take a penalty kick/puck before any player can take an additional
 penalty kick/puck.
- The referee shall signal for the penalty to be taken. The penalty kick/puck is completed when the ball stops moving, goes out of play (including over the crossbar) or a goal is scored.
- Only the players involved in the penalty taking competition, as well as the Referee, Linesmen and Umpires are permitted on the pitch.
 With the registered penalty takers located between the 45m & 65m lines closest to the end selected by the referee. Goalkeepers to be located 20m from the goals.
- All other players (including substitute goalkeepers), managers, officials, backroom personnel etc should be at their designated sideline area, and off the field of play when the penalty-taking competition is taking place.





READY FOR LIFT OFF

MW Hire O'Moore Park was the setting on a balmy Saturday evening. The destination for one side was history as Jim Gavin and his Dublin charges began a journey towards 5 All Irelands titles in a row. A feat that had not previously been achieved in the history of either code. It was a journey however, that ended in a way very few could have considered, the parting of ways and the breakup of a dynasty.

Having led his side to a place hitherto untraveled by any team ever, Jim Gavin and his aides-de-camp decided to step down from their roles. It was a move which shook the GAA world to its very core. The decision maybe not so much, but more so the timing with which it had arrived. Many felt that once the seemingly unachievable had been achieved, that it was then while basking in the glory of uncharted territory Gavin might make an announcement. However, if there is one thing that we have learned about Messer's Gavin and Co over their tenure, it is that they do not cow tow to external pressures around what may be accepted norms. No, instead in his usual inimitable style Jim allowed all of the focus be on his exceptional group of players. He could not contemplate allowing news around his departure to distract from what they had achieved, as ever with the Clondalkin native it was a player first approach.

When this announcement did arrive the inevitable questions followed, one looming larger than any other, who now? The hunt to replace the seemingly irreplaceable was well and truly on. Names hovered over airwaves and print pages waiting like dust mites on a mattress to see where best to settle. It was not long before one particle appeared larger on the horizon than any other. In a fitting way it was another who can immediately be recognised by a single name. It is a signal, if only a small one, of your standing in the microcosm that is the GAA universe. When one thinks of the others who have garnered this honor you begin to grasp the level of person you are dealing with Jim, Henry, DJ, Páidí an exalted few. These hero's can count amongst their ranks the most recent Dublin incumbent, step into the light young Dessie.

When finished carrying the hopes of the capital on the pitch, Dublins new man then began to make a name for himself away from the sod. Becoming a core part of the founding of



the GPA and beginning to nurture the next wave of sky blue wearing soldiers, to name but a few. Dessie had proved well and truly that he was ready for the call whenever it came.

This leads us to today, another Saturday evening in Portlaoise. Due to the strangest of years this one decidedly less balmy. Another historic journey begins. This one has had bumpier starts than the Parnell Park powers might have liked. A loss to Longford in the O'Byrne cup followed by a disjointed National League campaign which ended in the capital missing out on the first major silverware of the year. The name prowling the sideline is not the only the change either. Personnel too has naturally been shifted, as father time and circumstance mean we look for the first time at a Dublin team-sheet without the likes of Brogan, McCaffrey or Connolly.

Waiting with bathed breath to welcome the successor to Senior Inter County action are Jack Cooney and Westmeath. The Lake County are making considerable strides under the Cooney and emerged victorious against the Dubs on the previous competitive meeting that of the 2019 O'Byrne Cup Final. With the considerable talents of John Heslin and Kieran Martin at his disposal Cooney will be hoping that Saturday evening in Portlaoise proves historic in more than one way. With it being straight knockout the Midlander's will have absolutely nothing to lose. A position which in the past has seen them produce some of their best performances. A second half turn around, of astonishing proportions against their greatest rival's spring to mind. As they move towards the business end of Cooney's plan, a fitter, stronger and more tactically nuanced Westmeath await the reigning Champions.

Will the setting see the historic start of another journey towards unprecedented success or will it bear witness to another Lakeland upset? Either way it is safe to say, both sides are ready for lift off.

The overall picture of the Dublin-Westmeath relationship in the Leinster Senior Football Championship is one of Dublin dominance; of the eighteen meetings to date Dublin have won fifteen to Westmeath's three – Westmeath's greatest day came on June 6th 2004 when they defeated The Dubs by two points at Croke Pk in the quarter-final, en-route to winning their first and to-date only Leinster Senior title.

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

Who you coach – I have two players in particular that when they are playing against perceived stronger players, they withdraw from the games and do not perform to the level that I know they can play at. Is there anything I can do to help them?

When questions are submitted, they will be allocated to our team of professional and experienced coach developers who will work with coaches on providing the best options available to help address the coach's needs. We aim to provide an offering, throughout team of provincial coach developers, to all coaches' questions, either in a video format or a bespoke one to one online mentoring session.

LONGFORD V LAOIS



Laois and Longford are today meeting for the 15th time in the Leinster Senior Football Championship. Their first meeting was at O'Connor Pk in 1951 and Laois were victorious on that occasion. Longford won the next clash 3 years later at Mullingar and in the interim Laois have been victorious nine times to Longford's four. The most recent meeting was at O'Moore Pk on May 21st 2017 when the Kingston brothers Paul and Donie kicked 3–5 of Laois' total as they ran out convincing 11 point winners. Robbie Smyth kicked 11 points for the losers on that occasion.


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




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THE AGE OLD DEBATE, WHAT PREPARATION IS BEST?

For Wicklow, Longford and Offaly this weekend will be their second taste of what is our most unusual Championship to date. Will those who have had the benefit of an extra week's preparation fare better, or will the hindsight experts come night time on Sunday be espousing the benefits of championship action and the fact that you can't "buy match practice".

This debate will ever rage, especially while there exists the need for bye's and the uneven nature of any sporting competition. Many will claim to have an answer as they pontificate from the glorious height of 20/20 vision. However, the reality is that there is just no way of telling. For some the extra weeks preparation and the chance to watch their opponents the week previous will have been a god send. For more it will have all the appearance of a 14 day week. Sitting at home watching last weeks games like a coiled spring of energy, chomping at the bit ravenous for action. On the other side of the equation you will have three sides with the experience of the 2020 Championship and all that it offers. What did it offer last weekend? weather akin to that of a biblical nature and a nervousness that had all games coming down to the wire. Will this venture into the previously unknown stand them in good stead or will it lead to a hesitancy that can often be linked with knowing the path ahead.

LEINSTER GAA SENIOR FOOTBALL CHAMPIONSHIP 2020

For years this argument was focused on the Kilkenny hurlers who on their run to four in a row were often met with a five to six week break following the Leinster Championship. Whereas during this time Munster Final winners were seemingly struggling to reproduce the form that had seen them claim the Munster Cup.

People began to look at this and wonder what could be giving the cats such an edge. Was there a different mentality Nore side that kept the sharpness there? was there a method of training hitherto untried that left them primed for September action? or was it simply something in the water? The fact that their club championships kicked into action in the intervening period was held up as another guiding reference for the ability to navigate the gap. However, the reality is all of these were the case and yet none of them. It was simply down to a team operating at the peak of their powers in an environment which sought to make them better at every possible opportunity. Soon they too began to lose and the arguments would pendulum back towards benefiting those who were coming off the immediacy of competitive action.



For the teams this weekend it will come down to one thing and one thing only, the performance on the day. For each of the victors the preparations will have been the key to success. Their work done in the lead up the real difference between winning and losing. The management team will have nailed every check point on the way to victory. This will be the narrative in the immediate aftermath. However, how much of it rings true? The staunch truth of the matter is not a lot. Should one side lose out by the narrowest margins, and in the most agonising way, will their preparations have been futile? Will the last minute missed kick or conceded score have been the fault of that Tuesday morning session? The answer is a resounding no! In a society that is increasingly infatuated with results this will be the black and white world facing the winners and losers come Sunday evening.

It is, however, debates such as this that keep us going. So, while the preparations may not have the significant baring on the results that we would like, discussions around them will keep us going long into the nights of the festive season. And I for one welcome them with open arms in all of their futility.


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RECENT MEETINGS

Wicklow's only victory came on 26th May 1957 when they defeated The Royal's 3-7 to 1-11 at Geraldine Pk, Athy. The sides drew on one occasion and that was on 14th July 1991 at Croke Pk, at that stage Meath had already been involved in a 4 match saga with Dublin and won the replay by three points. 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
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


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
